1. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest.

2. MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON 18 JULY 2019

The minutes of the previous meeting held on 18 July 2019 were approved as a correct record.

3. MATTERS ARISING

Pedestrian Tyne Tunnel

The Committee had requested that a report be presented to a future meeting which provided an update on the Tyne Pedestrian Tunnel. Nicola Robason informed members that the Joint Transport Overview and Scrutiny Committee and the Joint Transport Audit Committee had received an update report on this matter, this paper was to be circulated to the Committee. Should members feel that additional information was still required they should contact Nicola Robason who will arrange for this to be made available.



The Committee felt that it needed to be clearer at the commissioning stage who managed the relationships between the contractors. It needed to identify who was responsible for the management of costs and timescales. The PTT cost a lot more and took way longer to complete than originally anticipated. Going forward there is a need to ensure adequate arrangements are in place when commissioning complex projects. The officers assured the Committee that it is planned to consider the project management arrangements around larger schemes in the current year. It was suggested that this be factored into the governance arrangements and programme management going forward.

The Committee requested further information be received on the UK Hydrogen Corridor.

NECA Overview and Scrutiny Committees- Workshop

The Policy and Scrutiny Officer to arrange the workshop. It was agreed that both the NECA O&S Committee and the Joint Transport O&S Committee members, substitutes and officers be invited. The purpose of the workshop is to consider the role of both O&S Committee's, the variation between the two Committees, what can be done to make the Committee's effective and consider a proposed programme of works for the year.

Once a programme of works is produced then consider how the Combined Authority might work with the North of Tyne CA and how best to include the LEP within any work going forward.

4. STATUTORY GUIDANCE ON OVERVIEW AND SCRUTINY IN LOCAL COMBINED AUTHORITIES

Submitted: Report of the Deputy Monitoring Officer (previously circulated and copy attached to the official minutes).



The Ministry of Housing Communities and Local Government had published formal guidance, 'Statutory Guidance for Local Authorities on Overview and Scrutiny' The new guidance clarifies the role and benefits of the scrutiny function within Local Authorities and Combined Authorities. The report provided a summary of the guidance. It is recognised that local authorities and combined authorities are best placed to decide how scrutiny works within their own political structures. The report sought to clarify the role and benefits of Scrutiny. The guidance is focussed toward highlighting best practice.

The six themes set out in the guidance were:

- Culture
- Resourcing
- Selecting Committee Members
- Power to Access Information
- Planning Work
- Evidence Sessions

A summary of the content of the six themes was presented, the full guidance was appended.

Members discussed the document at length. The Deputy Monitoring Officer agreed to produce a response to the guidance to be presented to the Leadership Board along with the recommendations of the Scrutiny Committee. The Scrutiny Committee made the following points:

- Consider how best to scrutinise the Executive and the LEP and consider the best process for working together
- Regular reporting system required from the O&S to the Leadership Board to influence decisions, it was agreed to recommend quarterly reporting.
- Consider a mechanism for the Chair and Vice-Chair to meet with the Leadership Board. It was suggested that perhaps the best mechanism would be to arrange for the Chair to attend Leadership briefings.
- In order to embed the culture of scrutiny within the organisation it was suggested that it be a regular item on the Leadership Board Agenda.
- Ensure Committee members receive adequate training.
- The Scrutiny Committee to consider commissioning a more focussed piece of work when appropriate. Identify good practice in other Combined Authorities, see what could be mirrored in NECA to improve how things are done.
- Cover who we can scrutinise, LEP, Transport Committee, procurement, contractors. Look at the outside bodies and consider how they feed into NECA. Cover in training who can scrutinise and how we do that.
- The guidance should cover the responsibilities of members in respect of behaving as a committee member in an impartial non-party political manner.



• The Committee suggested that a protocol be developed to manage disagreements or differences of opinions.

RESOLVED - That:

- i. the Deputy Monitoring Officer produce a report to Leadership outlining the Committee's recommendations:
- ii. the Deputy Monitoring Officer report the decision of the Leadership Board to the Committee and
- iii. the Deputy Monitoring Officer produce any necessary Committee protocols and guidance following the discussion at the Leadership Board.

5. FORWARD PLAN AND SCRUTINY WORK PROGRAMME

Submitted: Report of Deputy Monitoring Officer (previously circulated and copy attached to Official Minutes).

The Deputy Monitoring Officer presented the report which provided Members with an opportunity to consider the items on the Forward Plan for the current 28 day period and discuss items for the Work Programme for future meetings.

Paul Darby informed the Committee that the Leadership Board had considered the budget timetable and that in order for the process to run efficiently it may be necessary to hold an additional meeting of the Committee to consider the budget.

It was agreed that a workshop be set up as soon as possible to include both the NECA O&S and the JTC O&S with a view to producing an Annual work programme.

In response to comments, questions and points raised by Members, the following areas of work were noted for discussion at the workshop:

- Consider Digital Connectivity, is this sufficient, are all homes being built with potential access to the internet?
- Concerns were raised regarding the delay to the Fair Funding review, which
 has been moved to 2021. The Chief Finance Officer suggested the
 committee may consider the impact of this at a future meeting.
- Skills Agenda
- It was recognised that work was being undertaken by each individual Local Authority in relation to being prepared for Brexit. It was requested that Brexit preparedness in relation to the Combined Authorities work be considered and reported to a future meeting of the Committee. This report to consider the financial implications.



- Discussions around how best the Combined Authority could work with the North of Tyne Combined Authority.
- Concerns were raised over the clarity of information from the Government with regards to any continuity or replacement of the Shared Prosperity Fund once the UK has left the European Union and how his would impact on the funding of the Local Industrial Strategy given they are linked.
- The Local Industrial Strategy contained a list of projects. Members felt given the importance of these projects, more detail was required for effective scrutiny.
- The Committee referred to IAMP and how they might consider this, looking at its impact, accessibility, the potential impact on congestion on A19, the general impact of the Industrial Park on all constituent Authorities.
- Ensure the Agendas are structured to give the appropriate amount of time required.
- Any additional items for consideration be forwarded to the Chairman or Nicola Robason.

QUORUM

The Committee was informed that the meeting was not quorate and therefore if members wished to proceed, any decisions taken would need to be ratified at the next quorate meeting.

1. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

N Robason (Deputy Monitoring Officer) and Cllr R Oliver (Sunderland) sent apologies for absence.

2. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest.

3. MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON 19 SEPTEMBER 2019

The Committee was inquorate and therefore unable to approve the minutes of the previous meeting. The approval of the minutes has been deferred to the next meeting to be held 19 March 2020.

4. MATTERS ARISING

There were no matters arising from the informal discussion of the minutes of the previous meeting.

5. ANNOUNCEMENTS FROM THE CHAIR

The Chair informed the Committee that Cllr N Weatherley, a substitute member for Gateshead, had passed away. The Chair thanked Cllr Weatherley for his service on behalf of the Committee and respects were paid to Cllr Weatherley.

6. NECA BUDGET PROPOSALS

Submitted: Report of the Chief Finance Officer (previously circulated and copy attached to the official minutes).

Paul Darby, Deputy Chief Finance Officer, presented the report. The report provided the Committee with an update on the NECA Budget Proposals for 2020/21 as part of the budget consultation process. Paul Darby encouraged Members to provide any feedback on the proposals at the meeting so that the views of the Committee could be considered in the development of the final budget report to be presented to the NECA Leadership Board and the Joint Transport Committee.

It was noted that the budget proposals for 2020/21 are on a standstill basis, with no proposed increase in the level of contributions to the North East LEP, Invest North East England, NECA Corporate Costs, the JTC Accountable Body costs or the North East LEP Accountable Body costs.

Members noted that whilst the standstill basis for budget proposals is feasible for next year, in the medium term after 2021 this could cause pressures and pose challenges. Although the review and re-evaluation of the pension position reduced financial pressures in the short term, if challenges are not addressed, this could in the future affect the level of service provision or require cuts.

It was noted that the Tyne Tunnel tolls are proposed to be increased for Class 3 vehicles (HGVs) by £0.10p to keep pace with inflation, subject to approval by the Tyne and Wear Sub Committee in January 2020. Members noted that included in the appendices to the report are a range of models showing levy increases of +1% and -1% for information as requested by the NECA Leadership Board.

Paul Darby highlighted to Members that the budget proposals for 2020/21 are robust, balanced and will not require any need for service changes.

During discussion, Members raised the following points:

 the level of contributions from central government to the finances and budgets of NECA. Members were informed that whilst the government provides some funds in the form of grants, such as for the metro, Local Authorities are lobbying for a fair deal from the Fair Funding Review;

- lobbying work occurs collectively from organisations such as Nexus,
 Combined Authorities and the Joint Transport Committee, as well as individually Local Authorities;
- Members highlighted concerns about the pressure Local Authorities will be under in the future and the uncertainty surrounding the funding intentions of central government;
- Nexus has some reserves which could be used to address shortfall in future budgets, but Members noted that if nothing changes by 2022/23 then difficult choices will need to be made;
- Members welcomed that there would be no reductions in service in the coming year;
- work continues on the Tyne Pass Project, working towards a free flow system;
- the budget and levies for Durham Council and Northumberland Council are arranged by themselves, as opposed to the Tyne and Wear Local Authorities where Nexus arranges concessionary travel and contracts on their behalf;
- the level of Metro usage was raised, and this information would be circulated to Members:
- it was noted that NECA is currently operating within budget and that whilst Nexus slightly overspent, this can be offset from the reviewed pension position;
- the timetable for budgetary reports was noted and Members requested that routine reports be presented to the Committee so that they may track progress;
- the handover as Accountable Body of the NELEP from NECA to North of Tyne Combined Authority (NTCA) was noted and Members requested that they still be updated with reports outlining the activity of the LEP;

Members discussed the possibility of sending a letter from the Committee to the Government outlining priorities and the need for certainty regarding funding for budgets. The Committee noted that Cllr M Gannon had sent a letter on behalf of the Joint Transport Committee in his capacity as Chair. The letter sent from Cllr M Gannon was requested to be circulated to Members, along with a draft letter from the Committee to send to the Secretary of State for Transport.

RECOMMENDED – That:

- i. the report be noted.
- ii. information regarding the levels of Metro usage be circulated to Members.
- iii. Information regarding the letter sent by Cllr M Gannon to the Secretary of State for Transport be distributed.

7. STATUTORY GUIDANCE ON OVERVIEW AND SCRUTINY IN LOCAL AND COMBINED AUTHORITIES UPDATE

Submitted: Report of the Policy and Scrutiny Officer (previously circulated and copy attached to the official minutes).

Gavin Armstrong, the Policy and Scrutiny Officer, presented the update report. The report provided Members with a response to their recommendations to the NECA Leadership Board on the formal guidance published by the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government and the work undertaken since the last Committee meeting on the recommendations in response to the formal guidance.

Members noted that the NECA Leadership Board welcomes reports, recommendations and input from the Overview and Scrutiny Committee to feed into their decision-making process. The NECA Leadership Board would welcome regular meetings with the Chair and Vice Chair of the Overview and Scrutiny Committee to discuss, where appropriate, issues arising.

It was noted that the Committee keeps in mind the principles of good scrutiny and the use of the appropriate 'lens' by which to scrutinise papers. It was highlighted that the work programme provides good focus for the future and that it is a living document which can be updated and amended at any time.

During discussion, Members raised the following points:

- consideration of possible changes to the layout of reports to help the scrutiny process, including the possibility of using a Red, Amber, Green rating system;
- the progress of sharing best practice with other Combined Authorities.
 Members were assured conversations were ongoing and a visit to a similar Combined Authority was being progressed;
- meetings with the Chair and Vice Chair of the NECA Overview and Scrutiny Committee and the NTCA Overview and Scrutiny Committee have been ongoing and are to continue in the future;
- it was noted that training for scrutiny is provided by the Centre for Public Scrutiny, which could be considered;
- concerns about engaging the public were discussed, including the need for an interesting, relevant work programme and a user-friendly NECA website to encourage participation;
- consideration of possible changes to the layout of reports to include a section outlining the impact on climate change to ensure these factors are taken into account when scrutinising;
- the need for the work programme to contain items relevant to reflect the concerns of the public was noted, as well as the need for this to be advertised in a way which makes clear the impact this can have on our communities in order to encourage engagement;
- the Overview and Scrutiny Workshop held 14 November 2019 reminded Members that public engagement was a statutory responsibility and that the Committee should develop a style and approach which reflects that.

8. FORWARD PLAN AND SCRUTINY WORK PROGRAMME UPDATE

The update was presented by Gavin Armstrong, the Policy and Scrutiny Officer. The report provided Members with an opportunity to discuss the Forward Plan and the Work Programme for 2019/20.

It was highlighted that it is important for Members to be aware of what work other scrutiny Committees are undertaking, so as not to duplicate work, but to gain assurance that it can be discussed at this Committee also.

Members noted that Contract Commissioning appeared on the Work Programme as an item, as had previously been requested. P Darby informed Members that the internal audit team were undertaking a review in this area, the outcome of which would be brought to the Committee.

During discussion, Members raised the following points:

- the possibility of receiving updates and reports on ongoing projects in the area, for example the Tyne Tunnel and Testo's Roundabout;
- the Work Programme reflects the discussion which has happened at previous meetings and the Workshop;
- the Barriers to Work item on the Work Programme would be a good item to do an extended piece of scrutiny and review;
- the Local Industrial Strategy, particularly the IAMP, remains important and should be kept on the Committee's radar;
- it is encouraging to see Thematic Leads presenting items on the Work Plan.

Subject: Economic Development and Digital Thematic Update

Report of: Economic Development and Digital Thematic Lead

Executive Summary

The purpose of this report is to provide an update on activity and progress under the Economic Development and Digital theme of the Combined Authority.

The report provides an update of activity of Invest North East England; an update on the development of the North East Local Industrial Strategy; and an overview of the current activity within the European Structural and Investment Fund programme – including European Regional Development Fund and European Social Fund grant allocations, commitments and ongoing bids and calls.

The report also provides an update on the Strength in Places Fund and an overview of the latest position with regards to the UK's withdrawal from the EU.

Recommendations

The Overview and Scrutiny Committee is recommended to note the contents of the report.



1.0 Background Information

- 1.1 This report provides an update on activity and progress under the Economic Development and Digital theme of the Combined Authority, including:
 - Invest North East England and Trade activities
 - Local Industrial Strategy
 - European Structural and Investment Funds Programme
 - UK Withdrawal from the EU

1.2 Invest North East England (INEE)

1.3 Inward Investment Successes 2019/20

- 1.4 In the first three quarters of 2019/20 in the NECA area there have been 24 inward investment projects leading to 801 new jobs. These comprised of:
 - 17 FDI projects creating 494 jobs
 - 7 UK projects creating 307 jobs.

Across the wider region (NECA and NTCA) there have been 53 successes generating 1,860 jobs.

- 1.4 Key investment successes in the last two quarters included:
 - Ocado announced as first tenants in to The BEAM, Sunderland
 - Nuby announced its expansion in South Tyneside.
- 1.5 Going forward, the Invest North East England (INEE) team is very busy leading on a number of significant enquiries, predominantly in the advanced manufacturing, digital tech and business services sectors.

1.6 Marketing and Communications

- 1.7 Key elements in 2019/20 include:
 - Launch of six sector showcase videos
 - Production / launch of shorter themed videos to complement the above
 - Growing website traffic to the INEE websites
 - · Increase following on social media outlets
 - Improvement to the INEE website which has supported an improved Search Engine Optimisation ranking and visitor experience.



- 1.8 The team have featured in a number of panel discussions (i.e. Fintech North), media publications and attended key UK and international events to support the positive promotion of the North East as a key investment location, such as the British Ambassadors dinner for the Irish Immersive Tech sector in December.
- 1.9 Supported by the North East Local Enterprise Partnership (NELEP), a marketing strategy is also under development for 2020/21, which will comprise event attendance, digital marketing (social media) and possible paid-for advertising in key outlets (i.e. the continuation of Bdaily 'Hot Topics' sponsorship).

1.10 **Events**

- 1.11 The INEE team have already attended / exhibited at / sponsored a number of events in 2019/20 representing the region. Key events include:
 - XRTGO (April 2019)
 - Thinking Digital (May 2019)
 - Global Wind, London (June 2019)
 - Northern Exposure (September 2019)
 - NEAA Expo (September 2019)
 - MIPIM UK SUMMIT (October 2019) report attached at Appendix 1
 - Offshore Wind North East (November 2019)
 - Eirmersive Irish Immersive Tech Dinner (December 2019)
 - North East Built Environment Conference (Jan 2020).

The INEE team is also to sponsoring / exhibiting at the following events this month:

- Shared Services Leaders' Summit
- MIPIM Cannes

1.12 Lead Generation Contract

- 1.13 The sourcing of completely new leads for the North East is a vital part of INEE's activity, adding value to the NECA's local authorities' own activities. In 2019 INEE entered in to its second lead generation contract with OCO Global. The contract commenced in July with an amended specification which focuses on:
 - Companies in the Financial Professional and Business Services (FPBS) and the digital & technology sectors, which have a base in London, the South East of England, Northern Ireland, or the Republic of Ireland, and who would consider the INEE area as a potential area for re-location or opening a new facility
 - UK-based advanced manufacturing companies operating in one or more of the North East's key manufacturing sub sectors including:
 - automotive (especially electrical vehicles and supporting technology companies, including R+D functions)



- energy (including offshore wind technologies)
- o food and drink.

Whilst these are the primary target sectors/markets, projects outside of these broad sectors, but in line with any of INEE's other key sectors, will be sought.

The five key sectors are:

- Digital and Tech
- Energy
- Life Sciences
- Automotive and Advanced Manufacturing
- FPBS.

In addition to this external lead generation activity, in September 2019, INEE appointed a graduate intern to identify further leads in the key sectors, utilising a range of tools and databases. The intern has made good progress and several conversations are ongoing with potential leads.

- 1.14 Working with the Department of International Trade (DIT)
- 1.15 DIT National Sector Team briefings
- 1.16 In the past 12 months INEE briefed the national DIT teams responsible for Life Sciences, Energy & Infrastructure and Digital. These briefings are one way in which INEE and other partners ensure the DIT national teams have an up to date understanding of North East capabilities and opportunities in key sectors.
- 1.17 Northern Powerhouse Key Account Management Programme
- 1.18 INEE continue to manage the DIT Key Account Management Contract. The contract in the North East is performing very well. Account Managers across the local authorities are identifying new projects on a monthly basis with a number of key successes already this year.
- 1.19 **Trade Update**
- 1.20 International Trade Support Contracts
- 1.21 Rather than progress with the procurement of new International Trade Support Contracts, DIT have decided to issue a one-year extension to existing contracts.
- 1.22 This means the North East Chamber of Commerce will continue delivery of DIT trade support services in the North East until 31 March 2021.



1.23 DIT may still progress with a national ERDF grant to incentivise the uptake of international trade support from private sector providers. Further details are awaited.

2.0 Local Industrial Strategies (LIS)

2.1 The Government has requested that LISs are developed by LEPs – and in some cases Mayoral Combined Authorities – and submitted for refinement and eventual approval. Guidance published by Government in October 2018 highlighted that "Local Industrial Strategies will be long-term, based on clear evidence and aligned to the National Industrial Strategy".

2.2 The NELEP Local Industrial Strategy

2.3 Work has been done to develop a NELEP LIS in partnership, facilitated by the NELEP team. NECA has representation on both the Steering Group and the Working Group. A draft has been approved by the NELEP Board and submitted to Government for consideration / agreement.

3.0 European Structural and Investment Funds (ESIF)

3.1 The European Structural and Investment Fund (ESIF) programme continues to be delivered in the North East. The region is split into two areas: (1) More Developed (Gateshead, Newcastle, North Tyneside, Northumberland, South Tyneside and Sunderland); and (2) Transition (County Durham). An update on European Regional Development Fund, European Social Fund and European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development is provided below.

3.2 European Regional Development Fund (ERDF)

- 3.3 The notional allocation for the More Developed area is £176.9m, and in the Transition Area is £86.3m; a total for the NELEP area of £263.2m. Following the latest calls for projects which closed on 30 September 2019, the North East LEP Area ESIF Committee has now provisionally allocated all ERDF grant. It should be noted that while c.£179m of grant is legally committed/at contracting stage, the remaining grant allocation to projects is subject to full appraisal and due diligence, and therefore may result in the attrition of some projects.
- 3.4 Following this latest call over 30 pipeline projects have been invited to develop full applications or project change requests (for extension projects) across the three priority axes listed below:
 - Priority Axis 1 Promoting Research and Innovation



- Priority Axis 3 Enhancing the Competitiveness of SMEs
- Priority Axis 4 Supporting the shift towards a Low Carbon Economy in all sectors.
- The Government has confirmed that it will guarantee funding for ERDF projects that are contracted by the end of 2020. All contracted ERDF projects must be completed by the end of the programme period, 30 June 2023. Each application for ERDF will be required to demonstrate that it delivers good value for money and domestic strategic priorities.
- 3.6 It is intended that any ERDF grant not allocated through further North East LEP area calls will be recycled into the Reserve Fund which is being set up to ensure that the UK makes best use of remaining programme funds up to 2023. MHCLG is expected to confirm the arrangements for an ERDF Reserve Fund shortly.

3.7 European Social Fund (ESF)

- 3.8 Across the NELEP area there is a notional allocation of £224.7m (More Developed £161.3m, Transition £63.4m). As at September 2019, c.£97m has been legally committed in the More Developed area (60%) and c.£52m in the Transition area (82%). Subject to take-up and projects progressing to the contracting stage, it should be noted that commitment levels, including the pipeline applications and live/future calls, could increase to c.97% in the More Developed area and 110% in the Transition area.
- 3.9 The increase in commitment levels for ESF reflects the considerable technical assistance support reported previously, particularly in relation to the Skills for Growth call which closed in August 2019, and the two Inclusive labour market calls which closed in September 2019 and December 2019. In addition, the commitment figures also reflect recent extensions to the National Lottery Community Fund (previously Building Better Opportunities programme) co-financed projects.
- 3.10 The latest ESF Inclusive labour market call for projects issued in September 2019 generated considerable interest from applicants resulting in an overbid of c.£8m ESF. These projects are currently being appraised by DWP.
 - All ESF projects must be completed by December 2023 (projects must be completed no later than 3 years and 6 months after the proposed project start date).
- 3.11 A new ESF call for projects was launched in December 2019 in order to deploy approximately £10m of the remaining ESF allocation under Priority Axis 2 Skills for Growth. A regional event to identify potential projects was held by the North East Technical Assistance project. The deadline for full applications was 3 March 2020.



The activities proposed in this call will focus around the following areas:

- Support for Management, Leadership and Enterprise skills Support skills
 provision that delivers an increase in business starts targeted at the smart
 specialisation and growth sectors; pre-start support; entrepreneurial skills
 development; and training for innovators throughout their academic and
 business careers
- Support for employer led skills activities Focused on SMEs in smart specialisation and growth sectors
- Support skills development for the workforce Develop skills, including for those newly employed/ low skilled and those facing redundancy; enabling progress or sustainment in work. Focus on low skilled, tackling barriers to employment.
 Skills refresh e.g. IT skills/specific qualifications to address gaps in emerging technologies
- Support for industry specific intermediate and high-level skills that respond to employer demand and offer flexible responses to emerging and projected skills needs - Focused on smart specialisation and growth sectors.
- 3.12 As with ERDF, any ESF grant not allocated through further North East LEP area calls will be recycled into the ESF Reserve Fund, overseen by DWP, set up to ensure that the UK makes best use of remaining programme funds up to 2023.

4.0 Strength in Places Fund

- 4.1 Lead by UK Research and Innovation (UKRI), Strength in Places Fund (SIPF) is a new competitive funding scheme that takes a place-based approach to research and innovation funding, to support local economic growth. The fund aims to support innovation-led regional growth by identifying and supporting areas of R&D strengths that drive clusters of businesses that have potential to innovate, or to adopt new technologies, so that these clusters can become nationally and internationally competitive. Projects will bring together local collaborations building on the underpinning regional economic impact role of universities and other R&D facilities and engaging those businesses at the forefront of delivering economic growth through innovation within the identified economic geography.
- 4.2 In Wave 1, twenty-three bids across the UK were invited to develop full stage bids for submission by 18 September 2019. Two of these bids are in the NECA area: North East Cluster for Healthy Ageing and Independent Living (NE-CHAIN) led by



Newcastle University, and the Centre for Sustainable Advanced Manufacturing (CESAM) led by the University of Sunderland.

4.3 It is expected that the outcome of SIPF Wave 1 bids will be announced in spring 2020.

Strength in Places Wave 2 was launched in May 2019 with the deadline for Expressions of Interest (EOI) on 9 October 2019. Four EOIs from the North East were submitted and are with Government for appraisal:

- International Centre for Connected Construction
- Net Zero Heat
- Farm Zero
- Next Generation Text: Poetry, Literature, Literacy and Publishing.

EOI awards will be announced from June/July 2020. Selected proposals will enter a bid development stage in which up to £50K seedcorn funding will be awarded to support development of full business cases over six months.

5.0 UK Withdrawal from the EU

- 5.1 The UK formally left the EU at 11pm on 31st January 2020, having signed a Withdrawal Agreement with the EU. The Government has said that it will negotiate a trade deal with the EU and agree it on or before 31st December 2020.
- The timetable has been described as challenging by many and there is the possibility that the main aspects could be agreed while others are subject to further negotiation.
- If no trade deal is negotiated, then the trading relationship between the UK and the EU would default to World Trade Organisation terms which include some compulsory tariffs as well as customs checks. Trade between the UK and the EU would no longer be "frictionless" and some of the immediate threats of disruption at UK ports identified in a "no deal" Brexit situation would resurface.

Overview

MIPIM UK SUMMIT took place at a new venue in 2019, Old Billingsgate Market, London on 14th – 15th October 2019 and Invest North East England (INEE) attended with the Local Authorities plus numerous delegates from five private sector partners:

- Hanro Group
- Highbridge Properties Ltd
- Naylors Gavin Black
- Knight Frank
- Newcastle international Airport (did not attend MIPIM but sponsored event)

The **INEE stand** (20m²) was one of only four stands at MIPIM UK SUMMIT and located in the premium area. It accommodated two meeting areas, an informal breakout area, storage space plus tea/coffee making facilities. During the two-day event, INEE hosted a business showcase event and a drinks reception. The **business showcase presentation**, held on Tuesday 15th October in the Fish Market room, was entitled *Building a bright future for County Durham*.

Report of: Chief Executive of the North East Local Enterprise Partnership

Executive Summary

The report provides Committee with an overview of performance of the North East Strategic Economic Plan (SEP) targets, funding programmes and delivery programmes.

Recommendations

The Overview and Scrutiny Committee is recommended to note progress made against delivery of the North East Strategic Economic Plan.



1. Background Information

1.1 The North East Local Enterprise Partnership (North East LEP) is responsible for setting the economic policy for the North East and then leading its delivery with partners from across the region. The report provides Committee with an overview of performance against the regional North East Strategic Economic Plan (SEP) targets and key programmes' activities.

All 38 Local Enterprise Partnerships were required to produce a Strategic Economic Plan for the ten-year period from 2014-24.

The North East SEP was refreshed in January 2019 and can be found at: https://www.northeastlep.co.uk/the-plan

- 1.2 This report is set out in 3 parts:
 - An update on the regional SEP economic KPIs
 - An update on the North East LEP'sfunding programmes
 - An update on the SEP delivery programmes

2. Proposals

- 2.1 The SEP has 6 key performance indicators which measure the North East economy. These are to:
 - Create 100,000 more jobs in the North East economy by 2024 than there were in 2014
 - Have 70% of these additional jobs classed as 'better' jobs, which are defined as managerial, professional and technical roles
 - Close the gap with England excluding London in the employment rate for people aged 16 to 64 by 100% by 2024
 - Reduce the gap with England excluding London in the economic activity rate for people aged 16 to 64 by 50% by 2024
 - Reduce the gap with England excluding London in private sector employment density by 50% by 2024
 - Reduce the gap with England excluding London in productivity by 50% by 2024.
- 2.2 The current performance of the 6 KPI's is set out below.

More and better jobs - The aim is to have 100,000 more jobs in the North East economy by 2024 than there were in 2014 and for 70% of these to be better



jobs. Employment in all types of jobs in the North East rose from 811,300 in March 2014 to 884,400 in September 2019, an increase of 73,100.

Over the same period, employment in better jobs in the North East rose from 298,600 to 372,500, an increase of 73,900. The increase in better jobs is now equivalent to 101% of the net increase in all jobs.

Increased employment in better jobs has, therefore, driven the overall increase in North East employment and has more than made up for a slight fall in employment (by about 700) in other occupations.

A year ago, employment in all jobs had risen by 63,800 since March 2014 with about 77% of the additional employment being in better jobs. Since that date, employment has risen by a further 9,300, made up of an increase of about 24,500 in employment in better jobs and a fall in employment in other jobs of about 15.100.

Employment rate - Close the gap with England excluding London in the employment rate for people aged 16 to 64 by 100% by 2024

The North East's working age employment rate increased from 67.0% in March 2014 to 72.0% in September 2019. The equivalent rate for England excluding London had a smaller increase, from 72.1% to 76.2%, and the gap between the two rates decreased by 21%.

A year ago, the North East's employment rate was 71.6%, compared to 75.5% for England excluding London. At that point, the gap had decreased by 25% but it has increased slightly in the most recent 12 months.

<u>Economic activity rate</u> - Reduce the gap with England excluding London in the economic activity rate for people aged 16 to 64 by 50% by 2024

The North East's working age economic activity rate increased from 74.1% in March 2014 to 76.3% in September 2019. The England excluding London rate had a smaller increase, from 77.6% to 79.3%, and the gap between the rates decreased by 14%.

A year ago, the North East rate was 75.3%, compared to 78.7% for England excluding London and the gap had closed by 4%. During the past 12 months the gap has decreased further.

<u>Private sector employment</u> - Reduce the gap with England excluding London in private sector employment density by 50% by 2024

According to the latest annual data, the North East had 0.52 private sector jobs per working age adult in 2018, compared to 0.62 in England excluding London. The North East's figure is the same as in 2015, the earliest comparable date available, while the England excluding London figure has increased from 0.60. The gap between the two has, therefore, increased by 17%.



The 2018 North East figure is less than in 2017, when it was 0.53, while the England excluding London figure is unchanged. As such, the gap has continued to increase.

<u>Gross Value Added (GVA) per hour</u> - Reduce the gap with England excluding London in productivity by 50% by 2024

The North East GVA per hour increased by 8.6% between 2014 and 2017 (the latest data available) from £27.57 to £29.95. The equivalent rate for England excluding London increased by 6.6%, from £29.39 to £31.32. The gap between the two has decreased by 29%, more than half way towards the target of a 50% decrease by 2024. These figures have not been updated in the last year, with the 2018 data release having been delayed until 28th February.

3.0 North East LEP Funding Programmes - Update on Performance

3.1 The North East LEP is responsible for managing three funding schemes each of which support the SEP objectives. These are:

Growth Deal Local Growth Fund - £270.1m capital grant funding for a range of SEP focussed strategic investments – transport schemes, economic development site infrastructure, innovation and skills facilities.

Enterprise Zones – employment development site infrastructure – loan funding re-paid from business rates income raised from within these sites.

North East Investment Fund - £54m loan fund - mainly supporting commercial property schemes and specific business growth projects.

3.2 North East LEP Growth Deals: Local Growth Funding (LGF) 2015 - 2021

The LGF Programme has a budget £270.1m to help support the delivery of the North East Strategic Economic Plan 2014-2024. The six year capital funding programme commenced in 2015/16 and is currently approaching the end of its fifth financial year. In early 2019 a programme progress video was prepared featuring many funded projects. This can be viewed here https://www.northeastlep.co.uk/funding/local-growth-funding. The North East LEP website also includes a dedicated web page for each project that has received support.

Table 1 below provides a programme overview, showing projects broadly categorised under the SEP investment themes. Of the 147 projects currently in the Programme, 84 are physically and financially completed, 53 are approved and in progress and 10 in the pipeline waiting approval.

Five of the 'projects' are actually 'mini programmes' that are supporting smaller scale schemes. These are the Local Sustainable Transport Fund -



supporting 14 projects e.g. cycle schemes and urban traffic management systems and the North East Rural Growth Network Programme that is supporting more than 42 business growth and rural economic infrastructure projects. An Innovation project development fund has to date supported seven studies to further develop a strategic pipeline of projects across the North East whilst the 'Incubator Development Fund' has aided seven business incubator projects. In 2019, a new Energy for Growth Programme was approved and to date, 7 small scale renewable projects and feasibility/development studies have been approved with two more in the pipeline.

3.4 LGF Latest Budget Position

Of the £270.1m budget, 97% has been formally contracted and £243.6m has been spent up until 31st December 2019. In regard to the 2019/20 budget of £28m, 57% has been spent to date and whilst there is an estimated year end underspend of £2.6m, this is planned to be eliminated through mitigation measures to be agreed by the LEP Board prior to the financial year end. The overall budget and performance delivery of the North East LEP to date has been assessed by MHCLG as 'good'.

3.6 LGF Key Performance Indicators

The LGF programme measures progress against a wide range of performance indicators that reflect the diversity of projects that are being supported. Projects that are physically and financially completed only report data annually in April, so figures to date under present the true position as the actual data has not yet been received. There are currently two indicators (shown in red) where it is expected that the outcome this year will be below forecast.

3.7 <u>Enterprise Zones (EZs)</u>

The first round of EZs was launched in April 2012 to support economic growth by providing tax breaks to incentivise businesses to start-up, grow and expand. Subsequently, government approved a second round of designated sites that went live in April 2016. In total there are 21 Enterprise Zone sites in the North East, most of which require significant advance infrastructure funding to be able to effectively compete and attract business investment. To date, enterprise zone funding (borrowing) has been approved for 15 EZ sites totalling £131.7m to enable for example, site remediation, onsite and offsite highway infrastructure, drainage and the provision of utilities. From the approved budget, £48.4m has been spent to date. Two further EZ site applications are expected to come through for funding approval during 2020. Further information on each EZ site can be found on the North East LEP website here: https://www.northeastlep.co.uk/funding/enterprise-zones.

Business rates income projections are independently reviewed, every two years with the most recent update in July 2019, to provide assurance that income projections can cover the borrowing and interest charges. Income modelling updates are also routinely made to reflect performance monitoring updates from EZ site managers. Currently, over the 25 year life of the EZ sites, a positive surplus of £225.1m is forecast after all current and projected infrastructure borrowing has been re-paid from business rate receipts.

The latest EZ key performance indicators are shown in Table 4 below. Currently annual targets for 2019/20, where set, are expected to be achieved. No significant under performance is forecast.

3.9 North East Investment Fund (NEIF)

The North East Investment Fund is a loan fund that is made available to support capital projects that encourage local economic growth and create jobs. It has been operational since 2012 and was formed through combining Regional Growth Fund and Growing Places Fund budgets into £54 million fund. As an evergreen fund, repayments and interest from all loans is put back into the fund and re-allocated to support new projects. The current budget position is set out in Table 5. Part of the NEIF budget (£5.7m) was set aside in 2018 to form a pilot fund (North East Property Fund) totalling £10m (with matched funds from Santander) and is managed by FW Capital. This sub fund is focussed on enabling small, mainly housing developments by small scale local developers to proceed that cannot secure sufficient finance in the lending markets. To date, this fund has aided 11 schemes of which nine are housing, one mixed use and one commercial.

More recently, with the original NEIF loan allocations now beginning to be repaid in significant sums, plans are progressing to re-deploy and focus the balance of resources into two new funding regimes that are in the process of being introduced. These are the 'North East Inward Investment Fund' with a £8m NEIF funding contribution - this has gone live this month, and the 'Commercial Property' Fund that is planned to be launched later in 2020 and will aim to help stimulate investment in speculative commercial and industrial property developments.

The NEIF has invested over its lifetime into 28 capital projects with two further projects currently in the pipeline. The NEIF operates with a small number of performance indicators. Executive Summary

The purpose of this report is to provide Members of the Overview and Scrutiny Committee with an opportunity to consider the items on the Forward Plan for the current 28-day period and discuss items for the Work Programme for 2019 / 2020.

Recommendations

1. Background Information

- 1.1 The Forward Plan is a document which NECA is required to maintain under the Combined Authorities (Overview and Scrutiny, Access to Information and Audit Committees) Order 2017. The Forward Plan is published on NECA's website and lists the decisions that the North East Combined Authority intends to take in the coming months and must include all decisions to be made in the next 28 days.
- The Forward Plan template contains specific information relating to each decision, including the date the decision will be made, a brief explanation of the topic, the consultation to be undertaken, and contact details of the author. The Forward Plan template has recently been updated and includes further information including if the decision is a 'Key Decision' and if an item will be discussed in private.
- 1.3 Details of each decision are included on the Forward Plan 28 days before the report is considered and any decision is taken. This supports the transparency of decision making within the Combined Authority and allows members of the public to see the items that will be discussed. There are special procedures for circumstances where publication for the full 28 clear day period is impractical or where there is special urgency. Both of these procedures involve the Chair of the Overview and Scrutiny Committee and would be reported to the Overview and Scrutiny Committee at its next meeting.

Role of Overview and Scrutiny

- 1.4 The Overview and Scrutiny Committee examine any decisions of the North East Combined Authority be that by the principal decision-making body or a committee or officer holding delegated authority. This Scrutiny occurs in public and ensures democratic and public accountability.
- 1.5 One of the main functions of the Overview and Scrutiny Committee is the review and scrutiny of 'Key Decisions' made by the NECA Leadership Board and Officers of the Combined Authority. The relevant regulations set out a test for what should be considered a Key Decision being those which are most significant in financial or other terms. This is explained in the Decision-Making Protocol adopted by the Committee on the 15 March 2018. At the inaugural meeting of the NECA Leadership Board on the 13 November, following the governance changes, it was agreed that the Decision Making Protocol would remain in place:

- 1.6 It is NECA's practice to include formal decisions on the Forward Plan to maximise the opportunity for review and scrutiny. 1.9 The table above reflects that there have been no requests for general exception and no requests for special urgency since the last Committee.
